MANAGING THE HORDES

The reservation system has changed on a yearly basis in Yosemite, but the National Park Service (NPS) is well on its way to finalizing a definite plan for the future.

Potential plans were on display this past Monday as Park officials held a workshop at the Mammoth Lakes Community Center on Forest Trail.

This was one of several outreach workshops held in Yosemite gateway communities.

NPS started working on a "Visitor Access Management Plan" in 2022 as a way to effectively manage an increased number of visitors to the park.

Park visitation has multiplied, at least in part, due to an influx of lodging and short-

term rental companies popping up on the outskirts of the park, said Mark Rose, Sierra Nevada & Clean Air Program Manager for the National Parks Conservation Association.

Rose and others quoted in this story were in Mammoth on Monday.

These lodging developments are particularly pervasive on the west side of the park, he said.

This increase in visitation has led to road and parking congestion, long waits at entrances, insufficient staffing, vegetation impacts and human waste along roads, turnouts and in parking lots, according to the NPS website.

This summer, NPS released a document with four approach-

es to solving these problems, one of which will be the chosen to become the "Visitor Access Management Plan."

Those alternatives (discussed on the jump page - read on!) are still open for public comment through September 30.

NPS expects to announce its plan moving forward later this fall.

"We've had multiple periods where we've requested comments from the public, and at every stage, we've received a lot of comments, basically all different types," said Erin Gearty, NPS Archaeologist.

In the first public comment period, which was open from December 9, 2022 through February 3, 2023 the park received

SNOWCREEK LINES UP THE VIII BALL

Snowcreek development was on the docket on Wednesday's meeting of Mammoth's Planning and Economic Development Commission.

However, an extension of the overarching Snowcreek Development Agreement, set to expire in July 2025, was not.

What commissioners ultimately and unanimously approved was a tentative tract map and use permit covering the first phase of Snowcreek VIII.

This building phase would consist of 172 units spread across 41 buildings.

As the Town's legal counsel Andrew Morris explained, the commission's job Wednesday was to make legal findings as to whether it could approve the tract map, and "not to

determine whether it's a good project or not."

Is the tract map consistent with zoning? Consistent with the general plan? Has it undergone appropriate environmental analysis?

The answer was 'yes' on all counts, to the chagrin of some, who questioned whether a 15-year old environmental analysis (the initial environmental impact report was certified back in 2009) should govern the next phase.

Mammoth resident Greg Newbry also suggested to the commission that it could add conditions to an approval which could right past wrongs - specifically adding operational requirements to the Snowcreek golf course.

Morris politely rejected Newbry's suggestion.

"I don't doubt there were things left out," Morris began, alluding to the Snowcreek Master Plan.

**As Newbry slumped in the audience and shook his head*

But, continued Morris, you can't just add things in and create new standards. The Master Plan, as it sits now, doesn't require these things.

Chuck Lande, the Snowcreek Developer via his Chadmar Group, also disputed the idea that there were things left out in the first place.

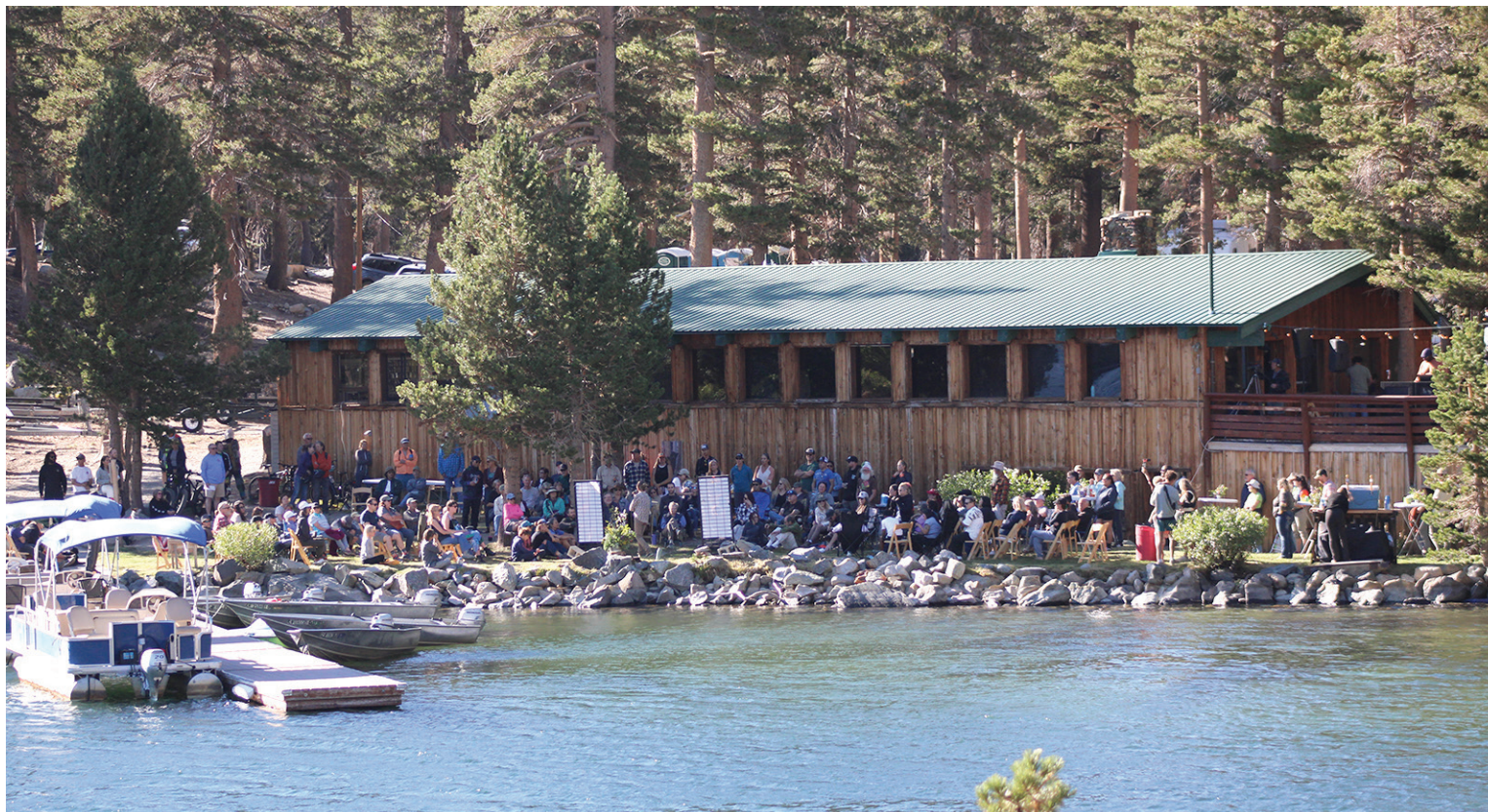
"Nobody forgot to do anything," he said, adding that it was always anticipated the golf course would be expanded if/when the planned hotel was built.

But hotels are very difficult to finance these days (The Limelight's getting done precisely because it doesn't need financing). And golf? Golf is not perceived in the way it used to be.

Golf, said Lande, used to be the default activity of 'old farts.' Now the old farts hike and bike

and are far more active.

“Habits have changed,” he said.
“Opponents of [Snowcreek VIII] want the town to force us to build golf. Under our existing entitlements, we’re not required to have it. In fact, I could apply for a map to develop it. I know that’s what the rumors say. That we plan to develop the meadow. But that’s not accurate.”
To jump ahead to the development agreement extension being contemplated now, Lande says it would establish an open space overlay. And Snowcreek would agree to operate the existing nine holes.

Community Development Director Nolan Bobroff confirmed that the existing nine holes were built under a use-permit in 1988, and there was no particular requirement for what the course should be, and no standards for the course included or defined in the Master Plan.

For perspective, Lande says it costs approximately \$1 million per hole, or \$18 million to build a championship golf course. At Rolling Hills Country Club, which features year-round golf via a private club membership, membership costs approximately \$2,000/month.

In Mammoth, golf courses operate three months out of the year if they’re lucky.

End of interlude.
Morris said a tentative tract map for phase one would remain in effect whether Snowcreek’s development agreement were extended or not.
The tract map would be good for two years upon its vesting date with a possible six-year extension per the Subdivision Map Act.
New PEDC Commissioner Lana Grand kept searching for a loophole to delay or circumvent approval.
But Bobroff said that even if one perceives there has been dramatic growth in town over the past few years, EIRs are focused on individual projects as opposed to addressing town-wide impacts.
Commissioner Greg Eckert grumbled, “This isn’t the first time we’ve said, ‘What were they [previous generations of commissioners and staffers] thinking when they agreed to that?’” But he also acknowledged, procedurally, that he really had no choice but to approve the tract map and use permit.

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And from Fisher’s desk ... insurance blues.
“We need to get back to a point where insurance companies are once again competing for your business,” said Mary Beth Bykowsky, Community Relations and Outreach Branch of the California Department of Insurance (CDI).
On Wednesday, she gave a presentation on the CDI’s approach to the fire insurance crisis to the Mono County Board of Supervisors..
The crisis exists because insurance companies will not provide coverage in high risk areas unless they can cover 100% of consumers’ claims, their expenses, and earn a fair return, she said.
Rate filings have become more complex and can take longer than six months to review, and one entity alone can prolong rate filings. And unlike public utilities which are required to provide coverage to all residents and businesses, insurance companies can legally refuse coverage.
This means more and more insurance companies have denied coverage to property owners in California as wildfire risk has increased.
The credit rating agency AMVEST has downgraded the outlooks for top 12 companies like State Farm, AAA, and Mercury.
The California FAIR Plan (CFP) offers basic fire protection for people who can’t find private coverage. It is run and funded by insurance companies and only covers fire, lightning, smoke, and internal explosions.
To make that plan more affordable, the CDI has begun incentivizing fire preventative home improvements, as part of their “Safer from Wildfires” framework in August 2023.
“Under this regulation, we expect to see more businesses, homeowners, and communities making investments in wildfire safety, greater community resilience, reduced losses from wildfires, and more insurance coverage for mitigated properties,” Bykowsky said.
Homeowners should contact their broker to find out how to qualify and

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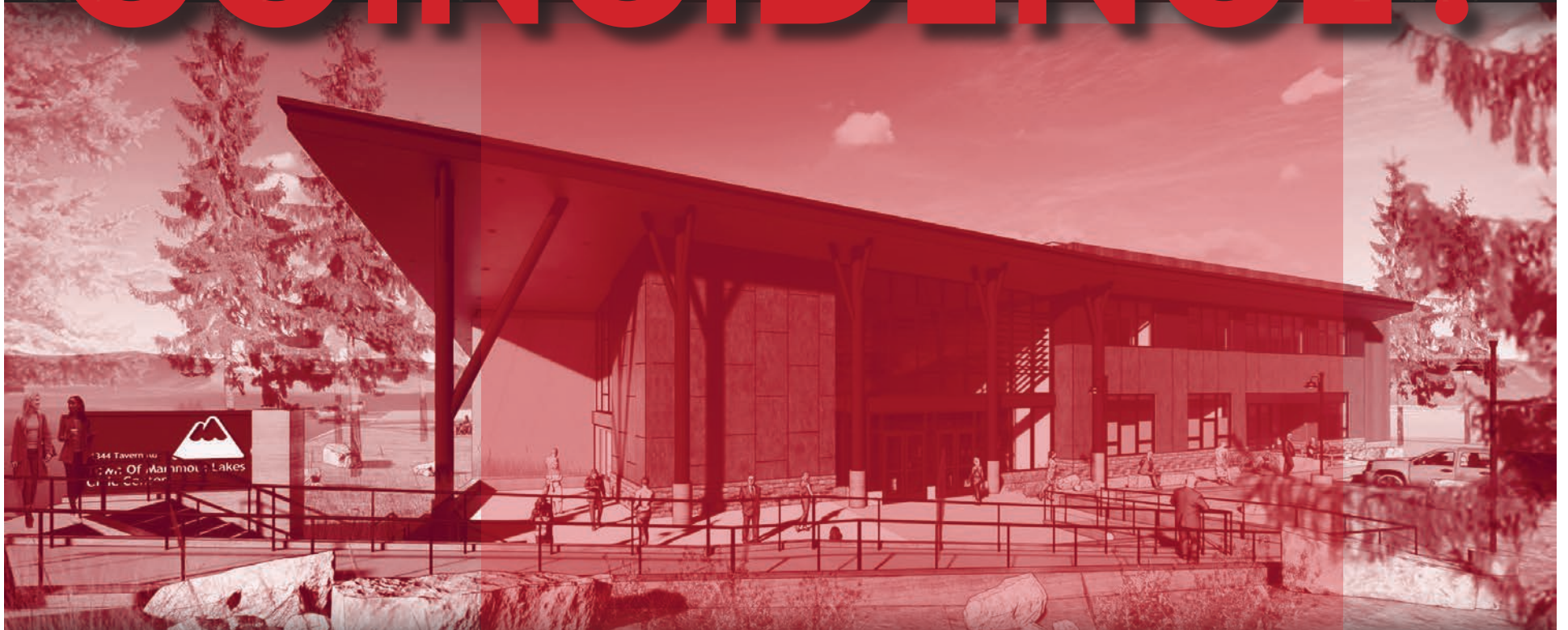

Rubearcon crossing

Dear Editor,

I crossed the Rubicon . . . that moment a photo appeared of Bear Victor, with blood pooling around his mouth, lying in the dirt of the Bishop Landfill.

Bear Victor SHOULD NOT HAVE BEEN KILLED! (*my opinion, and here is why*).

Just way too many conflicting stories circulating everywhere – word of mouth, Facebook and social media, The Sheet articles, TOML Council meeting of Wednesday September 4th, and Moday's gathering at Pokonobe Marina at Lake Mary celebrating a majestic spirit, an ur-sus americanus (black bear) who walked amongst us in the Lakes Basin.

My crossing began with the use of the words – euthanized is so humane; habituated – to become accustomed or used to something (foraging?); and others like attack, took a swipe, aggressive behavior ... this list is long.

Add in the presentations by California Department of Fish & Wildlife and the U.S. Forest Service emphasizing their (robust – my word) educational programs, but “we can do better” justification. Gentlemen, your programs with all their good intentions are not working.

The proverbial “nail in the coffin” though were the presentations & comments from the campground hosts, who pointed out that for over three years of their stewardship – NO CDFW or USFS personnel ever visited them, nor the campgrounds. (the field of battle is lit-

tered with good intentions and slogans “we can do better”). They also noted, in contrast, that the MLPD visited regularly.

Bears, like humans and other animals, have a “CRITICAL SPACE” to be respected. That widely circulated video of camp 9 & 10 where Bear Victor is seen at the picnic table, then WALKS BY THE WOMAN on the tree stump to the “bear box.” Finding nothing, Bear Victor turns around, then the woman makes a slight movement and a bear swipe ... Bear Victor continues walking away while the woman runs to her family members standing off-camera.

My understanding is that Bear Victor was first noticed at campsite 1, banging

and loud voices were raised, he continues up through camp sites 2, 3, 4 . . . all the way to 9 & 10 – not really aggressive bear behavior, more like foraging.

YET, CDFW & most likely USFS determined that the bear was a danger, to be “euthanized.” And “euthanized” with a poisonous substance which prevents Bear Victor from being buried in his national habitat. They dumped him 4,000 feet lower in elevation in the dirt, at the landfill – and they got caught by a photo ... a photo that broke my heart, and launched my march across the Rubicon.

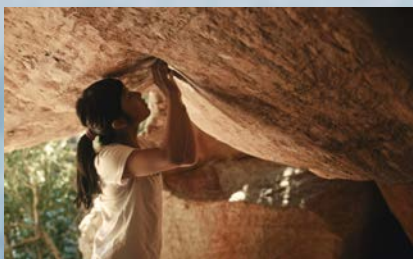

HOUSING OF CARDS

The lack of housing in general and affordable housing in particular is the most cursed and discussed issue everywhere in Inyo County ... except in the Inyo County Board of Supervisors' meeting room.

The board slogged through the details of the county's \$93 million General Fund 2024-25 budget for three hours before the topic of housing came up. And even then, there was no talk of working on solutions or adopting plans to address the issue.

Indeed, there was no acknowledgement of how the housing shortage is having a negative impact on the ability to attract and retain workers in the public and private sectors, which limits business development and the overall local economy. And, just as important, there was no discussion of how limited housing options impact the ability of long-time residents to stay in their communities or help younger residents to stay.

Instead, the question of housing made a cursory appearance and was quickly ushered out of the meeting room.

The abbreviated housing “discussion” came up only near the end of the Sept. 10 budget hearing when the supervisors were trying to decide what to do with an “extra” \$973,000 that landed in their laps after balancing the budget. The unexpected cash arrived thanks to the county having a larger “fund balance” left over from last year, which is money that was budgeted and not spent.

Second District Supervisor Jeff Griffiths suggested the county move some of that money into a separate account set aside for housing. At the very least, that would indicate the county is serious about the issue. He noted that “local contributions” seem to be the key to landing state grants or funding for housing programs and having no dedicated housing funding is one reason the county has not been able to take advantage of that state funding and otherwise “move” on the housing issue.

Crickets.

First District Supervisor Trina Orrill agreed with the concept of setting aside funds exclusively for housing and went a step further. She said the county could consider allocating a small percentage of excess fund balance each year to a housing fund so it will grow over time.

More crickets.

There was some mumbling from staff about the limitations and complexity of creating and then spending money from a separate fund or trust account and how it would be easier to take money from the Contingency Fund to match future housing grants. Or maybe if something comes up regarding housing it can be addressed at the mid-year budget review.

That was all the majority of the board needed to hear. The “excess” funds were promptly dealt with by placing \$500,000 in the Contingency Fund, some of which could cover the near certainty of across-the-board raises for county employees, and parking \$400,000 in the Administrative Capital Outlay account which can be used to cover cost overruns on the large number of infrastructure and construction projects underway or planned in the coming year. The final \$73,000 was moved into the Parks Improvement Fund.

The rest of the budget discussion and

the budget itself were routine.

About 63% of the \$93 million General Fund will go for salaries and benefits for the roughly 479 full time county employees plus a scattering of part-time and seasonal workers (the “full time equivalent” number is 500). Three departments account for the bulk of workers: HHS, 154; Public Works, 95; Sheriff/Probation, 108; leaving 143 workers to run the rest of the county.

General Fund revenue comes primarily via Aid From Other Governments, accounting for \$36.2 million or 41% of the total (that state and federal money is

mostly spent in HSS and Public Works). Property taxes total \$18.4 million (21% of the total); Bed Taxes of \$4.2 million, the highest ever, are just 5% of the total and sales taxes at \$1.8 million or 2% of the total revenue.

The county will be spending about \$2 million in federal “earmarks” on a new Bishop Airport Terminal and a \$1.5 million earmark for new fire stations in Tecopa and Charleston View. Another \$1.2 million is set aside for “facility improvements,” with an additional \$923,000 slated for parks and campground projects.

This year should also see the comple-

tion of some significant projects, including upgrades to the Sheriff's Administrative Offices and Jail, completing the HVAC upgrade and remodel of the historic Independence Courthouse, and completing the rebuild of Whitney Portal Road which was obliterated during Tropical Storm Hillary. The Portal road costs will be shared with the Federal Highway Administration.

Jon Klusmire of Bishop kept track. The five supervisors asked 19 questions during the budget hearing. Orrill asked 11. No one else asked more than three.

Death Valley Park biologists suspect toxic algae kills eleven burros

DEATH VALLEY, Calif. – Eleven burros recently died near Owls Hole Spring in Death Valley National Park. The cause of death is under investigation, but the National Park Service (NPS) suspects a harmful algae bloom was to blame.

The NPS warns that the water in Owls Hole Spring should be considered unsafe for humans or pets to drink or touch. In addition, people and pets should not handle any of the carcasses. Park rangers installed a warning sign.

Algae and cyanobacterial occur naturally in water and are more likely to grow into a harmful algae bloom when water is slow-moving, warm, and contains high levels of nitrogen and phosphorous, such as from fertilizer or sewage, according to the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

All three of those conditions existed at Owls Hole Spring this summer where the water is stagnant. Death Valley experienced its hottest summer on record this year and feral burros defecated in and near the water.

So far only dead burros have been found, but other animals were likely affected. No pupfish live in this spring.

“I hate to see any animal suffer,” said Superintendent Mike Reynolds. “The National Park Service is working to remove feral burros from Death Valley, for their own safety and to reduce impacts to native wildlife.”

Burros are not native to Death Valley. The park’s estimated 4,000 burros are descendants of animals released by miners decades ago. The NPS seeks to

relocate feral burros from the park. Due to lack of funding, roundups have not been conducted on a large scale since 2005. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has worked with the NPS to remove 43 burros in recent years. The nonprofit Peaceful Valley Donkey Rescue has captured 256 burros from the park since 2018. The park has funding to resume roundups in fiscal year 2026.

BASE jumper perishes

On Saturday, August 31, , a Mono County Sheriff’s Deputy was approached by an individual reporting his BASE jumping partner, Leonardo Durant, was missing after a jump from Mount Morrison.

Based on the information gathered, a Search and Rescue (SAR) mission was activated. Mono County Sheriff’s Office SAR members were immediately deployed to search the areas around Mount Morrison. Due to the large search area, a California High Patrol Helicopter H-40 was requested from the Fresno area to assist. The H-40 crew was able to successfully locate Durant on the craggy slope of Mount Morrison. Based

on observations from H-40 personnel, it was determined that Durant was deceased.

SAR members were flown in to develop a recovery plan but due to the altitude, location, slope angle, weather, and rock type, a hoist recovery with the H-40 was not possible. It was also determined, based on SAR members observations and area knowledge, that a top-down rope recovery would be extremely dangerous, and a bottom-up approach was not possible.

A mutual aid request was placed to Yosemite Search and Rescue (YOSAR) for assistance utilizing SAR-551, YOSAR’s helicopter and Helicopter Rescue Tech team. After mission planning took place in conjunction with YOSAR and Mono Sheriff’s SAR coordinators, a recovery mission began on September 2, 2024. The team successfully recovered Durant’s body from Mount Morrison and transferred him to the Coroner’s Office.

BASE (Building, Antennae, Spans, Earth) Jumping is the sport of jumping with a parachute from a fixed object, such as a cliff or bridge. Durant was an experienced BASE jumper who used a “wing suit” in his jumps.

Senator kinky

It hardly gets more sordid than this.

In the news this week: A former aide is accusing California State Sen. Marie Alvarado-Gil of forcing him into a “sex-based, quid pro quo relationship” which even led to sex-related injuries.

According to a story which appeared this week in the Daily Beast, former

Chief-of-Staff Chad Condit, 57, claimed that the senator began asking him “if he had ever cheated on his wife and asked if (he) would ever be intimate with a boss” shortly after he was hired in December 2022.

Condit’s father, former Democratic Congressman Gary Condit, had been accused of affairs—including with missing/murdered intern Chandra Levy—which prompted Alvarado-Gil to allegedly ask whether Condit “would be like his father,” according to the affidavit.

And apparently, he was.

The straw that literally broke Condit’s back? He claims he “suffered a back injury while performing (oral sex on Alvarado-Gil) in a car seat with his body having to twist and contort in the confined space of the car.” The pain led Condit to the doctor where he “discovered that the injury was more severe, and that (he) had suffered three herniated discs in his back and a collapsed hip.”

Condit alleges he was fired in December 2023 after he refused to wear a Santa Claus costume and had been reprimanded by a human resources representative for refusing [some of] Alvarado-Gil’s advances.

Alvarado-Gil made headlines last month for switching sides of the aisle, abandoning her state’s Democratic majority for the Republican minority, because, as she asserted, “the pendulum has swung so far to the left that it has disengaged from what true Californians value.”

ELIA, KEEHN RUNNING FOR BISHOP SCHOOL BOARD

Four candidates are running for two spots on the Bishop Unified School Board this election cycle. The candidates are incumbent Steve Elia, Michelle Mulligan, Jamie Morley (who ran the previous cycle) and Karen Keehn.

Two candidates (Elia and Keehn) responded to interview requests. Their profiles appear below:

Karen Keehn

Karen Keehn is a lifetime educator who entered her 49th year in the classroom this fall.

After a four-year stint down south, she moved here to take a job at Bishop Elementary in 1979. She taught third grade for 33 years until her official “retirement.”

In retirement, she has continued working at Bishop Elementary, teaching art.

Keehn has never served on a school board, but felt compelled to run given the threats and aggressiveness towards school boards in recent years over Covid protocols and then health curriculums.

“Everyone thinks I’m crazy running for school board, based upon what school boards have been going through ... but this is not a political position. This is about the kids, not the political party you identify with ... and there are a few people running who want to make it more about that.

There are good things happening in the district right now (she cites a recent grant which added teachers in music and the performing arts). Nothing’s perfect, but things are relatively



calm right now. I believe in our public schools,” concluded Keehn.

Keehn is supportive of the school bond measure on the November ballot - “some things haven’t been upgraded in thirty years, fifty years” and is supportive of teachers, especially those who have taught through and beyond the pandemic.

“If they’re still teaching, they are super-dedicated ... what teachers deal with now is so hard, harder than when I was [teaching third grade], as more kids have experienced trauma ... Anyone teaching special ed or junior high, you have a special place in my heart.”

Steve Elia

Steve Elia is a 1.5 term incumbent. He resigned during his first term because his wife had taken a job with the district, which created a one-year

conflict of interest.

After that year ended, he ran in the next election and won.

He has served as board president for the past two years.

Elia moved to Bishop in 1996. He taught English at the high school for 15 years before taking a job as a program specialist with AVID, an educational non-profit.

As Elia explains, AVID’s mission is about “closing opportunity gaps,” and he approaches being a board member with similar focus.

He quoted a national survey which found that just 33% of graduating high schoolers feel they’re ready for life after.

“We want our kids saying they got what they needed [in the Bishop schools] to be successful ... and we want staff saying they got what they needed in order to prepare our kids.”

Some accomplishments he points to are a commitment to maintaining smaller class sizes (especially at the elementary school), an increase in health and behavioral services for students, a multi-year investment in staff development via UDL (Universal Design for Learning) and the completion of a comprehensive facility Master



Plan which paved the way for this fall’s school bond measure (which he supports).

All three of Elia’s children have attended Bishop schools.

His son graduated last year and has matriculated at the University of Nevada-Reno.

His daughters are seniors at the high school.

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BURROWS RUNNING FOR SMHD BOARD

There are four candidates vying for three seats on the Southern Mono Healthcare District Board this November

The incumbents are: Ryan Wood, a well-known local attorney and son of Rick Wood, a former Town Mayor.

Alec Clowes is a software engineer and businessman/entrepreneur who moved to Mammoth Lakes in 2019 and serves as the treasurer for the board.

Laurey Carlson works as a General Manager at Mammoth Mountain Ski Area. She's served on Ski Patrol for over two decades and has her Emergency Medical Technician certification.

Which brings us to the challenger, Jennifer Burrows, who is well known in the community, having served as a Mammoth Lakes Planning and Economic Development Commissioner (PEDC) for the past eight years.

"There's not a lot of people who have all the knowledge and education that I do who will or want to run for the board," she said.

People also know Jennifer through her husband, Craig Burrows. He was the former Mammoth Hospital Chief Medical Officer and her candidacy comes a year after his departure from the role.

"I started talking about the decision to run before he left," she said. "It didn't play into it, it just happened to be around the same time."

While she thinks her husband did a great job in his role as CMO, she wants people to see her as an individual candidate, she said.

Burrows ran for Mammoth Lakes Town Council twice. After being unsuccessful in those races, she joined the PEDC as a way to build up her political resume, she said. But healthcare is her true passion.

"This is something I consider myself an expert in - healthcare," she said. "I

feel like I need to use that expertise and give back. That's what drives me."

Burrows has been a nurse for 25 years, or in her words, "too long." She holds a doctorate in education with an emphasis on healthcare administration and leadership and currently teaches nursing students at Cerro Coso Community College.

She also served as the Deputy Director of Mono County Public Health for two years, from 2021 to 2023.

"Three out of the five board members have no medical background," she said. "And I think it's very important to have someone who's had that experience."

Burrows is specifically excited about the opportunity to work on the North Wing project, a major remodel for the hospital in which the inpatient and ancillary services will be moved to a new building.

Construction for the project is slated to commence in May 2025 and is expected to be completed by 2028. The term for Southern Mono Healthcare District Board begins December 6, 2024 and lasts four years.

"I think it's really hard to plan a new wing, a new hospital, without really knowing anything about patient care," she said. "You have people who have

no idea about healthcare making decisions that are going to impact our community, not just my generation, but the next generation as well."

Burrows said she worked in a hospital in San Diego during a full reconstruction and she was part of the planning for that hospital, specifically the ER.

She has disagreed with a few choices by the board on their plans for the project thus far, namely she wants to build out the number of beds and to add another endoscopy room.

She also wants to make sure the Board is prepared to train staff on the new building's layout, which took six months to accomplish in the San Diego rebuild.

As a broader mission, she hopes to improve communication between administration and staff and forge a better work culture.

Currently, the staff doesn't trust the system that allows them to anonymously report issues to administration, she said. This means if there's mistakes or bad performances, they aren't reported.

"There needs to be an opportunity for staff to voice their concerns," she said.

She also hopes to improve outreach to more rural parts of the county and to better communicate with the spanish-speaking population.

"The hospital has a great education program and they do a lot of outreach," she said. "But I think the North County is just kind of cut off from all that, espe-

cially when roads close."

To solve this issue, she wants to appoint a point-person to improve communication between public health and the hospital to determine what resources are needed, she said.

Elder care also needs to be a priority. There are more elderly people here than people think - just go to the Snowcreek pickleball courts for proof, she told me.

"There's studies out there that say there's going to be a nursing shortage," she said. "And there's going to be a shortage of hospital beds and nursing home beds as the baby boomers start aging up and are getting sicker."

Her experience in patient care leads her to believe she will be able to predict and prepare for trends like this.

Burrows will stay active in the community no matter the outcome, she says.

A FAIR IDEA

Sometimes a simple solution is staring everyone in the face but folks are too bust wringing their hands to notice.

This could be the case when it comes to cleaning up the raft of issues arising from the board of the Tri-County Fairgrounds being stripped of power and put in limbo by the California Department of Food and Agriculture, which is the actual big boss over the fairgrounds.

It is obvious the state wants to see some changes at the Fairgrounds and in the makeup of its board of directors. The recent damning audit, resignation of CEO Jen McGuire and having the board relegated to the cheap seats as spectators are pretty clear signals more changes are on the horizon.

A simple change that could alter the entire direction and fate of the Fairgrounds would be to appoint a full board of nine members. Currently, and for as long as anyone can remember, there have been five board members, all from Inyo County. That is not how the fair board is supposed to be constructed. The makeup of the board is supposed to be five members from Inyo, and two members each from Mono and Alpine counties. That would make the “Tri-County” moniker a reality. (The distant

board members could attend by Zoom).

It’s well past time to spread the workload and responsibility to Inyo’s neighbors to the north, who have as vibrant of an agricultural economy and heritage as Inyo.

If that happens, there could immediately be four new board members bringing fresh eyes, perspectives and energy to the board. Plus, I would expect at least a few of the current board members will be invited to leave. There are some ugly spats, hurt egos and damaged relationships between some board members and the state Food and Ag folks. Long memories are not unique to Inyo County. A few might also resign after all the drama this year. The end result could be a mix of up to six new board members, with two or three experienced holdovers to provide some history and continuity.

Getting a fully empowered and functioning board should be the first priority.

Second priority is shooting down the idea of the City of Bishop and Inyo County saddling up a posse to ride to the Fairgrounds rescue. The idea that city and county government will miraculously turn around a money-losing fair and event center is almost laughable. Governments are not structured to be money-making enterprises. And to

those who think “local control” will be better than “state control,” here’s a reality check: The city and county auditors, lawyers, personnel departments and risk managers are just as persnickety as their state counterparts, and rightly so. There will be red tape and bureaucratic hurdles and headaches if government is involved on any level.

So, exploring the idea of separating the fairgrounds from the state and creating some unknown, unnamed non-profit or quasi-governmental entity to take over and run the fairgrounds is a rabbit hole. No need to waste time diving into that.

Instead, Inyo and Bishop elected officials should devote some time and whatever political capital they have with the governor to urge him to appoint a full board of directors with representatives from all three counties.

That would be the simplest, quickest way to begin moving beyond the current drama and deadlock and starting the hard work it will take to create a new era at the Tri-County Fairgrounds.

receive this discount.

In September 2023, the governor reached out to the commissioner to expedite another package of regulatory solutions called California's Sustainable Insurance Strategy.

This regulation requires Insurance companies to cover at least 85% of homes and businesses in wildfire distressed areas. A preliminary list of distressed counties have been drawn up, and Mono County is one of them.

California's Sustainable Insurance Strategy aims to bring FAIR plan policyholders back to private insurance, with priorities given to homes and businesses who took the mitigation steps outlined in the "Safer from Wildfires" framework.

The policy also explores allowing a California only reinsurance cost, meaning that Californians will not pay for the cost of hurricanes, fires, and floods across the nation and around the globe.

It also requires insurance companies to give insurance candidates their wildfire risk score and tell you what factors went into creating it.

The wildfire risk score or classification must be provided to the property owner

at the following times: within 15 days of when they apply for a new policy, at least 45 days before you renew a policy, at least 75 days before they are non-renewed, and within 30 days of when they complete mitigation on your property and request a revised score.

"That's one misconception – that when insurance companies pause or restrict new business, that consumers will be dropped immediately and left without coverage," Bykowsky said. "It's not six months, but you do have much longer time than you used to have."

Additionally, CDI and the CFP reached an agreement to increase the commercial coverage limit to 20 million per structure. This agreement is new and probably won't be enacted until the end of 2025.

And lastly, the regulation for the first time gives people the right to appeal through the CDI. They can make sure that the company followed all the rules and regulations for non-renewal.

The Department of Insurance will hold a virtual public hearing to take input on the proposed regulation on September 17, 2024, at 10 a.m.

almost 7,000 comments.
NPS Project Manager Rachel Collins said every comment is read and coded manually.
“It is our commitment to the public that every comment that we receive – that if you guys are gonna take the time to make a comment – we’re gonna take the time to read it,” she said.

Before 2020, there were no reservations required to enter Yosemite.
A reinstallation of this approach, labeled “Alternative A: No Action, Continue Current Management,” in the document, means visitors would continue to access the park on a first-come, first-served basis 24 hours per day.
The National Park Service would close areas of the park when parking areas filled up, NPS stated. Visitors would likely still experience long waits at entrance stations and heavy congestion within the park.
This a reactive approach, not a proactive one, said Lissie Kretsch, NPS Wilderness Education Coordinator. Although it seems like the most laissez-faire solution, it really means front-line staff would be tasked with managing people head-on.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, to manage the spread of the virus, NPS used a reservation system for the first time in Yosemite. Under this system, individuals could only enter the park during peak visitation times if they’d made a reservation online.

These reservations were paused during the 2023 season but reinstated this summer so that NPS could test a day-use peak hours reservation system pilot.
The 2024 pilot program was similar to the COVID-era program, except it included weekend-only periods during the early and late peak seasons, allowed afternoon entries, and increased the number of reservations available.
They are still monitoring the effectiveness of this system.

Other parks, such as Glacier, Rocky Mountain, Acadia and North Cascades have implemented similar reservation systems in recent years.

A version of this model, labeled “Alternative B: Parkwide Reservations – Peak Hours, Daily,” is identified in the document as being the preferred method for managing the park in the future.
Upon initial implementation of this method, reservations would be required from 5:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and are valid for a three-day period, allowing visitors to enter and leave the park at any time within their three-day reservation window.
Visitors with overnight reservations

within the park or in Yosemite West would have access to the park for either the three-day parkwide reservation period or the duration of the overnight reservation, whichever is longer.
The other two proposed alternatives detailed in the plan are also reservation systems, but they have caveats.
“Alternative C: Parkwide Reservations – Timed Entry” is a timed-entry reservation system, in which visitors are required to arrive at the park during their designated window of time.
The final option, “Alternative D: Yosemite Valley Access Reservations – Timed Entry” only requires people to book reservations for Yosemite Valley, the most popular area of the park.
While this alternative would restrict Yosemite Valley access, it would allow people unable to secure a reservation to explore other areas of the park.
All of the alternatives prioritize maintaining nonrecreational pass-through travel for locals, access to privately owned land, commercial visitor services and access for tribal groups.
They all also aim to improve visi-

tor communications, technology and transit services.
Regardless, implementing one of these strategies will have a cost, and those are resources the NPS doesn’t necessarily have delegated yet.
“You will never find a park superintendent who doesn’t say we need more money,” Yosemite Superintendent Cicely Muldoon said. “We are working really hard to figure out funding sources to improve the communications technology at the gates.”
The budget for NPS was cut last year, and is likely to be either cut or maintained this year, Rose said. Even if the budget stays the same, though, NPS programs will still take a hit because of inflation.
There are some saving graces. For example, the Great American Outdoors Act took on some infrastructure issue costs. And 80% of the entry fee for the park goes directly to Yosemite programs.
But these advancements are expensive, and implementing them might mean cutting programs elsewhere, Rose said.
On top of that, staffing is a major issue. Due to the rising cost of living and housing shortages, the Yosemite administration can not presently fill all of their positions, said Joe Meyer, Yosemite Chief of Staff.
“It’s a battle,” Muldoon said. “It’s a constant battle.”

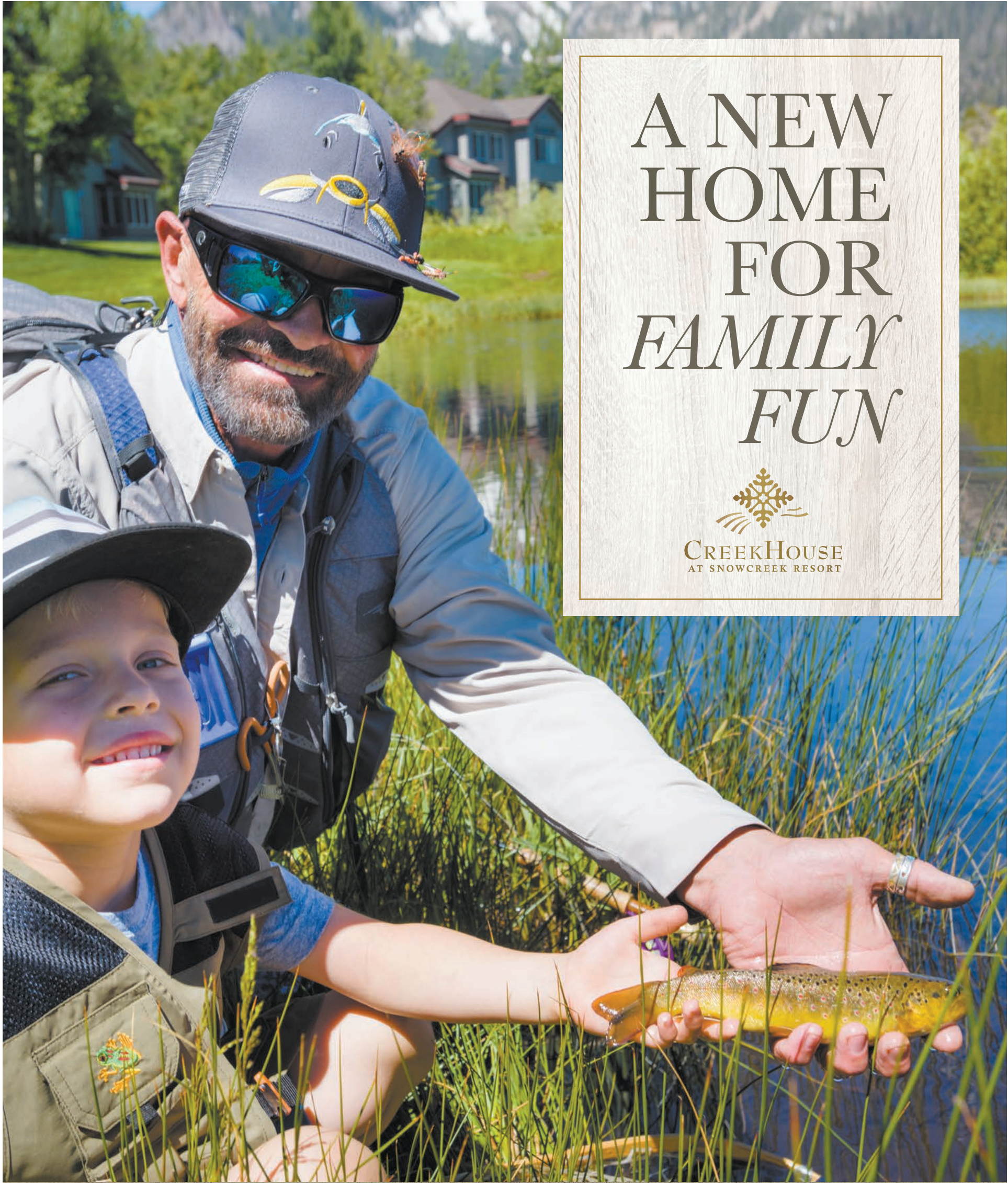
